Louisiana Book Festival Returns on November 1st

The 21st annual Louisiana Book Festival will be held from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. in down-town Baton Rouge at the Louisiana State Capitol, the State Library of Louisiana, Capitol Park Museum, and the surrounding Capitol Park area.

Among the writers featured this year are Wally Lamb, whose latest book *The Riv*er is Waiting is a recent Oprah Winfrey Book Club selection, and Ricky Riccardi. Director of Research Collections at the Louis Armstrong House Museum in New York, who examines the legendary trumpeter's rise to fame in Stomp Off, Let's Go: The Early Years of Louis Armstrong. A cooking demonstration will be provided by Marcelle Bienvenu, author of Who's Your Mama, Are You Catholic, and Can You Make a Roux? All told, authors will participate in more than one hundred programs, including WordShop writing seminars the day before the festival.

Poet Julie Kane will be presented with the 2025 Louisiana Writer Award, which honors outstanding contributions to the state's literary and intellectual life exemplified by a contemporary Louisiana writer's body of work. This year's One Book One Festival discussion will focus on the short stories of noted Louisiana historical author Kate Chopin. DB 122747 The God of the Woods by Liz Moore

Early morning, August 1975: a camp counselor discovers an empty bunk. Its occupant, Barbara Van Laar, has gone missing. Barbara isn't just any thirteen-year-old: she's the daughter of the family that owns the summer camp and employs most of the region's residents. And

this isn't the first time a Van Laar child has disappeared. Barbara's older brother similarly vanished fourteen years ago, never to be found.

Fall Book Recommendations 2025 by Sneha Padumane

DB 128966 Fun for the Whole Family: A Novel by Jennifer E. Smith

The four Endicott siblings—Gemma, Connor, Roddy, and Jude—were once inseparable, a bond created by the absence of their dazzling, mercurial mother, who would return for a few weeks each summer to whisk them off on sprawling road trips around the country. Decades later, the unthinkable has hap-

pened and the Endicotts haven't spoken in years...until an out-of-the-blue text arrives from Jude, now a famous actress, summoning them to a small town in North Dakota.

DB 128045 How the World Made the West: A 4,000 Year History by Josephine Crawley Quinn

Oxford historian and classicist Josephine Quinn upends two centuries of conventional historiography, troubling the waters of our Western origin story as she locates the roots of the West in everything from literature from Sumeria, the law codes of Babylon, metallurgy from the Hittites, to sculpture from Egypt, irrigation from Assyria, and the art of navigation and the alphabet from Phoenicia, to name just a few examples. Rather than the very popular 'West and the rest' view of history, Quinn demonstrates that cultures come to life by borrowing heavily from others, near and far.

DB 129025 *Elphie: A Wicked Childhood* by Gregory Maguire

What happened to young Elphaba before her witchy powers took hold in Wicked? Almost 30 years after publication of the original novel, for the first time Gregory Maguire reveals the story of prickly young Elphie, the future Wicked Witch of the West.

DB 129030 Home of the Happy: A Murder on the Cajun Prairie by Jordan LaHaye Fontenot

On January 16, 1983, Aubrey LaHaye's

body was found floating in the Bayou Nezpique. His kidnapping ten days before sparked 'the biggest manhunt in the history of Evangeline Parish'. But his descendants would hear the story as lore, in whispers of the dreadful day the FBI landed a helicopter in the family's front lawn and set out on horseback to search for the seventy-year-old banker. Decades later, Aubrey's great-grand-daughter Jordan LaHaye Fontenot asked her father, the parish urologist, to tell the full story.

DB 129108 The Café With No Name by Robert Seethaler

Summer 1966. Robert Simon is in his early thirties and has a dream. Raised in a home for war orphans, Robert has nonetheless grown into a warmhearted, hard-working, and determined man. When the former owners of the corner café in the Carmelite market square shutter the business, Robert sees that the chance to realize his dream has arrived

DB 128997 *My Next Breath: A Memoir* by Jeremy Renner

In this debut memoir, Jeremy describes in blistering detail his accident and the aftermath. This retelling is not merely a gruesome account of what happened to him; it's a call to action and a forged companionship between listener and author as Jeremy recounts his recovery journey and reflects on the impact of his suffering.

DB 129683 The Inside Game: Bad Calls, Strange Moves, and What Baseball Behavior Teaches Us About Ourselves by Keith Law

Keith Law analyzes baseball's biggest decision-making successes and failures, looking at how gambles and calculated risks of all sizes and scales have shaped the sport, and how the game's ongoing data revolution is rewriting decades of accepted decision making. In the process, he explores questions that have long been debated, from whether throwing harder really increases a player's risk of serious injury to whether teams 'overvalue' trade prospects. Bringing his analytical and combative style to some of baseball's longest running debates. Law deepens our knowledge of the sport in this entertaining work that is both fun and deeply informative.

DB 126842 Dear Laura: Inspector Lintott Mysteries, Book 1 by Jean Stubbs Wimbledon, England, 1889. When Theodore Crozier is found dead the neighborhood hopes the cause may be suicide, if only to spare further pain for both his dutiful wife Laura and beloved brother Titus. However, there is more to the matter and Inspector John Joseph Lintott is sent in to investigate. The further he delves into the mystery the more tangled it becomes.

DB 121516 A Journey of Faith: A Mother's Alzheimer's, A Son's Love, and His Search for Answers by Edward Grinnan Grinnan, Guideposts' Editor-in-Chief, reveals his deeply personal and hopeful journey of faith through his mother's Alzheimer's and his own fear of getting the disease. A blessing and encouraging

read for anyone facing trials, Edward understands the fear and panic of memory loss and Alzheimer's all too well. He watched Alzheimer's take its ruthless course with his lovely, funny, and intelligent mother, Estelle, and was haunted by the question: will it happen to me too?

DB 127340 A Forty Year Kiss: A Novel by Nickolas Butler

Charlie and Vivian parted ways after just four years of marriage. Too many problems, too many struggles, even though the love didn't quite die. When Charlie returns to Wisconsin forty years later, he's not sure what he'll find. He is sure of one thing—he must try to reconnect with Vivian to pick up the broken pieces of their past. But forty years is a long time. It's forty years of other relationships, forty years of building new lives, and forty years of long-held regrets, mistakes, and painful secrets.

DB 129330 No Bad Parts: Healing Trauma and Restoring Wholeness with the Internal Family Systems Model by Richard Schwartz

Dr. Schwartz's Internal Family Systems (IFS) model has been transforming psychology for decades. With No Bad Parts, you'll learn why IFS has been so effective in areas such as trauma recovery, addiction therapy, and depression treatment and how this new understanding of consciousness has the potential to radically change our lives.

DB 128640 Doctor Who and the Dalek Invasion of Earth by Terrance Dicks
The TARDIS lands in a London of future times, a city now ruled by Daleks. The Doctor and his companions meet a team

It provides a dynamic learning environment where a child can enjoy new reading experiences through interactive tools and activities. The Lab is located on the first floor of the State Library and is available to the public during operating hours from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. Monday through Thursday.

homeworklouisiana/learn-more. Homework Louisiana provides live tutoring for grades K-12, college and adult education, test preparation, and job search assistance to all Louisiana residents. Academic tutoring is now available from 2 p.m. to midnight seven days a week. Self-study tools for AP, ACT/SAT, and GED are also available 24/7. In addition, there is a "connect with voice" option for the visually impaired. Students may now access this service from any internetconnected computer or mobile device during these hours; even from a school campus after 2:00 pm. Homework Louisiana is funded in part with a Library Services and Technology Act grant from the Institute of Museum and Library Services, the State Library of Louisiana, and your local public library.
