The NLS Alexa My Talking Books skill is officially available for service.

What is My Talking Books on smart speaker? My Talking Books is an Amazon Alexa skill that NLS patrons can use to access and stream English language audiobooks from BARD. Using the skill's voice-only interface, you can search the BARD catalog, manage your wish lists, book lists, bookshelves, bookmarks, preference settings, sleep timer, reading speed, jumping in time, and bookspecific volume setting, as well as find book descriptions and review your streaming history.

For those of you who had existing My Talking Books accounts prior to October 2025, your profiles have been retained.

Talking Book Topics and BBR

Due to the 43-day federal government shutdown in October and November, NLS will not produce Talking Book Topics (TBT) and Braille Book Review (BBR) for November-December 2025. The TBT and BBR January-February 2026 issues are now in production and are scheduled to be on time for the new year.

You can use "Package Pickup" service to return library materials

When you are ready to return your Braille and talking books, you can easily schedule free pickups of those packages from your home or office through the United States Postal Service (USPS). This service can save you a trip to the post office!

Your letter carrier will pick up your package when your regular mail is delivered. You can arrange a next-day pickup or let them know when your package will be ready to go. Packages must be ready for shipment before your carrier arrives. Requests must be made by 4:00 a.m. on the day you wish for pickup to occur. Maximum weight per package is 70 pounds. There is no limit to the number of packages that can be picked up. When scheduling, mention that your items are "Free Matter for the Blind" library materials being returned to the State Library (or Utah Braille Library for Braille books).

DB 129256 The Mesopotamian Riddle: An Archaeologist, a Soldier, a Clergyman and the Race to Decipher the World's Oldest Writing by Joshua Hammer

The Mesopotamian Riddle tracks the decades-long race to decipher the oldest script in the world. It's the story of a swashbuckling young archeologist, a suave British military officer, and a curmudgeonly Irish rector, all vying for glory, from the ruins of Persepolis to the opulence of Ottoman-era Baghdad, in a quest to unearth the relics of lost civilizations and unlock the secrets of humanity's past.

DB 128910 Lonesome Justice by Donald L. Robertson

In Presidio. Jake Clay Barlow, Texas Ranger, never turned his back on a friend, and he wasn't starting now. After receiving the cryptic message from Jake Coleman, his good friend, and fellow Texas Ranger, he immediately headed west. But the reason he now finds himself staked out in a dry river bed in West Texas was his thoughts of the girl he met in Austin. He had ignored his first rule. Always be alert. His mind, occupied with smiling lips, blonde hair, and blue eyes, failed to register the desperados until they had the drop on him.

DB 128476 The Counterfeit Countess: The Jewish Woman Who Rescued Thousands of Poles During the Holocaust by Elizabeth White and Joanna Sliwa

World War II and the Holocaust have given rise to many stories of resistance and rescue, but The Counterfeit Countess is unique. It tells the remarkable, unknown story of 'Countess Janina Suchodolska,' a Jewish woman who rescued more than 10,000 Poles imprisoned by Poland's Nazi occupiers. Incredibly, she eluded detection, and ultimately survived the war and emigrated to the US.

DB 129032 *Moscow X: A Novel* by David McCloskey

A daring CIA operation threatens chaos in the Kremlin. But can Langley trust the Russian at its center? CIA officers Sia and Max enter Russia under commercial cover to recruit Vladimir Putin's money-

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man. They pose as a couple to target Vadim, Putin's private banker, and his wife, Anna. As they descend further into a Russian world dripping with luxury and rife with gangland violence, Sia and Max's only hope may be Anna, who is playing a game of her own.

DB 128488 Eat Your Age: Feel Younger, Be Happier, Live Longer by Ian K. Smith

In Eat Your Age, acclaimed doctor and bestselling author Ian K. Smith shows readers the steps they need to take in their 30s, 40s, 50s, and beyond to increase longevity and stave off future illnesses and ailments. By eating the right foods, keeping tabs on the right numbers, moving the right way, and sleeping better, we can slow the hands on the proverbial clock. Since food is medicine, this book will teach you what to eat at every age to prevent life-threatening diseases.

DB 128632 *Topped Chef* by Lucy Burdette

Hoping for some good publicity, Hayley's boss at Key Zest magazine signs her up to help judge the Key West Topped Chef contest. Stakes are high as the winner could be the next cooking show superstar. When one of the other judges turns up dead, the police assume his killer is one of his business rivals. But Hayley wonders whether someone is taking the contest a little too seriously.

DB 129305 Love and Let Die: James Bond, The Beatles, and the British Psyche by John Higgs

The Beatles are the biggest band in the history of pop music. James Bond is the

single most successful movie character of all time. They are also twins. Dr No, the first Bond film, and Love Me Do, the first Beatles record, were both released on the same day: Friday, October 5, 1962. Told over a period of sixty dramatic years, this is an account of how two outsized cultural phenomena continue to define American aspirations, fantasies, and our ideas about ourselves.

DB 129034 South of Nowhere by Jeffrey Deaver

A small town in Northern California is at risk of being destroyed by a failing levee, and Colter Shaw has been hired to locate a family swept away by the raging water, with mere hours to survive. But is the levee at risk of failing from natural causes or is someone sabotaging it? With the help of his sister, Dorion, the duo must save the citizens before the old town washes out at the hands of a secret conspirer.

DB 128906 Resolute: How We Humans Keep Finding Ways to Beat the Toughest Odds by Benjamin Hall

After suffering horrific, nearly fatal injuries while covering the war in Ukraine in 2022, Benjamin Hall was told he'd need to spend two years in a hospital learning how to walk again. Instead, he made it home to his family in just six months. Now with a greater degree of perspective, Hall analyzes the psychological aftermath of the Russian missile attack that profoundly altered his life.

DB 127419 *A Cowboy in Amish Country* by Patricia Johns

Ranching in Amish Country is both a challenge and a joy for Wilder Westhouse. Though he'll never be fully accepted, he relies on his neighbors. Hiring Amish runaway Sue Schmidt as a ranch hand could cause problems, especially since her family lives next door. And falling for the beautiful and pregnant cattlewoman will strain relations further and complicate both their lives, unless love can mend fences and families.

DB 129035 Dimming the Sun: The Urgent Case for Geoengineering by Thomas Ramge

Award-winning science writer Thomas Ramge's Dimming the Sun is his provocative, informative, urgent, and necessary exploration of this intriguing stopgap solution. Ramge shows us how the science works, what the risks are—both geophysical and political—and how the international community might come together to agree on and regulate a safe and effective plan for geoengineering.

DB 127136 Hidden Star by Nora Roberts

Private eye Cade Parris takes one look at the beautiful blond who walks unannounced into his office and falls in love. Unfortunately, Bailey James is there to hire him. Fragile and clearly vulnerable, she doesn't even know who she is. Nor does she know why she's carrying a tote bag filled with more than a million dollars in cash, a pistol, and a priceless blue diamond.

DB 127756 Force of Nature: Three Women Tackle the John Muir Trail by Joan Griffin

Three friends, women in their fifties, set

out to hike the John Muir Trail. From the outset, their adventure is complicated by self-inflicted accidents and ferocious weather, then enriched when they adopt a young hiker abandoned by her partner along the trail. The women experience the terror of lightning at eleven-thousand feet, the thrill of walking through a towering waterfall, and the joy of dancing among midnight moon shadows.

DB 126425 *Tales of Dune* by Brian Herbert and Kevin Anderson

Frank Herbert's magnificent Dune saga sprawls across countless planets and tens of millennia, but while the main novels concentrate on major events and major characters, a universe this complex begs for additional stories, filing in all the details that may sometimes get overlooked in the telling of the main saga. Tales of Dune collects eight such stories, ranging from the period of the Butlerian Jihad, to the time of young Paul Atreides, to a story set during the events of the novel Dune, to the very end of Frank Herbert's future history.

DB 126825 Zeppo: The Reluctant Marx Brother by Robert Bader

Zeppo was the Marx Brother who didn't want to go into the family business. A juvenile delinquent in his teen years before joining his brothers on stage, Zeppo balanced two careers: auto mechanic and petty criminal. He was, in short, a complex character, and his own family never quite figured him out. This biography gives a lively account of this checkered life and career.
