Open Beta for My Talking Books Alexa Skill

NLS has opened beta registration for the new My Talking Books skill on Amazon Alexa-enabled smart speakers. NLS patrons who register for open beta will be onboarded on a first-come, first-serve basis until all 5,000 license seats are filled. BEP Currency Reader App Available

EyeNote, a free currency reader mobile app for smart devices distributed by the Bureau of Engraving and Printing, is now available for both Android and iOS. EyeNote uses image recognition technology and the device's integrated camera to recognize a Federal Reserve note and communicates the note's denomination back to the user. The currency reader mobile app does not authenticate a note as being either genuine or counterfeit.

BARD Express Adds In-Application Player

NLS is pleased to announce the release of BARD Express, version 3.1.0.1. This release improves the long-awaited BARD Express Player, which allows patrons to choose an audio book or magazine from their BARD Express bookshelf and listen to it directly on their PC. Much like BARD Mobile, with the BARD Express Player, users can adjust the narration speed; jump to navigation points such as part, chapter, and article; create bookmarks; and much more. Users can also create global settings for narration speed, auto-play, auto-rewind, and more.

Patrons using JAWS and NVDA can either use the tab key to move to each of the player's functions or tap a single letter assigned to that function. For example, they can type F for fast forward, R for rewind, and B for bookmarks. A complete list of commands can be found under the Help menu of BARD Express.

Scripts are built into the 2024 version of JAWS to optimize the BARD Express Player. Patrons using JAWS 2022 or 2023 can download the same scripts from the BARD Express page on the NLS website at www.loc.gov/nls/how-to-enroll/sign-up-for-bard-and-bard-mobile/welcome-to-bard-express and import them into their screen readers.

Winter Book Recommendations By Sneha Padumane

DB 119061 Endurance: Shackleton's Incredible Voyage by Alfred Lansing

Bound for Antarctica, the Endurance set sail from England in August 1914. In January 1915, the Endurance became locked in an island of ice. For ten months the ice-moored Endurance drifted northwest before it was finally crushed. But for Sir Ernest Shackleton and his crew of twenty-seven men the ordeal had barely begun.

DB 119801 *The Pursuit of Happiness* by Jeffrey Rosen

The Declaration of Independence identified 'the pursuit of happiness' as one of our unalienable rights, along with life and liberty. Jeffrey Rosen, the president of the National Constitution Center, pro-

files six of the most influential founders to show how they understood the pursuit of happiness as a quest for being good, not feeling good -- the pursuit of lifelong virtue, not short-term pleasure.

DB 119624 Why We Read by Shannon Reed

In this uproarious exploration of the joys of reading, a long-time teacher, lifelong reader and *The New Yorker* contributor shares surprising stories from her life and the poignant ways in which books have impacted her students and shows us how literature can transform us for the better.

DB 119543 It All Comes Back to You by Beth Duke

Alabama, 1947. War's over, cherry-print dresses, parking above the city lights, swing dancing. Beautiful, seventeen-year -old Violet lives in a perfect world. Every-body loves her. In 2012, she's still beautiful, charming, and surrounded by admirers. Veronica "Ronni" Johnson, licensed practical nurse and aspiring writer, meets the captivating Violet in the assisted living facility where Violet requires no assistance, just lots of male attention. When she dies, she leaves Ronni a very generous bequest only if Ronni completes a book about her life within one year.

DB 120776 The Book That Broke the World by Mark Lawrence

The Library of Alexandria died in fire. Others fade away with less drama, ignored, forgotten, left to dust. To the athenaeum though, the great library of which

all others are echoes, fires are merely a temporary inconvenience. The only true threat to the library's existence is a book—the one Livira wrote. Livira's book also brought her together with Evar, a young man who was raised in the library itself, and they discovered secrets that no one else had uncovered. But now they are separated—and something hunts them both.

DB 119863 Many Things Under a Rock: The Mysteries of Octopuses by David Scheel

A behavioral ecologist's account of his decades-long obsession with octopuses. How does a soft and boneless creature defeat sharks and eels, while thriving as a predator of the most heavily armored animals in the sea? And how does a solitary animal form friendships, entice mates, and outwit rivals?

DB 120247 All Day and a Night: A Novel of Suspense by Alafair Burke

When psychotherapist Helen Brunswick is murdered in her Park Slope office, the entire city suspects her estranged husband—until the District Attorney's office receives an anonymous letter. The letter's author knows a chilling detail that police have kept secret: the victim's bones were broken after she was killed. Her injuries were eerily similar to the signature used twenty years earlier by Anthony Amaro, a serial killer serving a life sentence for his crimes. Now, Amaro is asking to be released from prison, arguing that he was wrongly convicted, and the true killer is still on the loose.

DB 120971 Never Leave the Dogs Behind: A Memoir by Brianna Madia

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In her debut memoir, Nowhere for Very Long, Brianna Madia reflected on her life as a nomad, free to roam some of the most beautiful land in America. Now the van life adherent faces the unfathomable darkness that comes from a life blown apart, her only solace the support of her dogs. In the wake of a painful, public divorce and the ensuing fallout, Brianna moves from a pared-down van into a pared-down trailer. She reckons with her decision to be alone in the desert, living on a nine-acre plot of undeveloped land on the dusty outskirts of a small town in Utah, accompanied only by her four precious dogs: Bucket, Dagwood, Birdie, and Banjo. Brianna wonders where, exactly, the road less traveled has led her.

DB 120671 *Life Unseen: A Story of Blindness* by Selina Mills

Imagine a world without sight. Is it dark and gloomy? Is it terrifying and isolating? Or is it simply a state of not seeing, which we have demonized and sentimentalized over the centuries? And why is blindness so frightening?

In this fascinating historical adventure, broadcaster and author Selina Mills takes us on a journey through the history of blindness in Western Culture to discover that blindness is not so dark after all. Inspired by her own experience of losing her sight as she forged a successful journalistic career, *Life Unseen* takes us through a personal and unsentimental historical quest through the lives, stories and achievements of blind people — as well as those sighted people who sought to patronize, demonize and fix them.
